(8 points) 1. Given $f(x, y) = 2 - x^4 + 2x^2 - y^2$. Find all local maxima, local minima, and saddle points.

$$f_x = -4x^3 + 4x$$

$$f_y = -2y$$

$$f_{xx} = -4x^3 + 4x = 0$$

$$f_y = -2y = 0$$

$$-4x(x^2 - 1) = 0$$

$$y = 0$$

$$x = 0, \pm 1$$

$$(0, 0), (1, 0), (-1, 0)$$

$$f_{xx} = -12x^2 + 4 \quad f_{xy} = 0 \quad f_{yy} = -2$$

$$(0, 0) \quad D = (4)(-2) - (0)^2 = -8 < 0 \quad \text{saddle point}$$

$$(1, 0) \quad D = (-8)(-2) - (0)^2 = 16 > 0 \quad f_{xx} = -8 > 0 \quad \text{local maximum}$$

$$(-1, 0) \quad D = (-8)(-2) - (0)^2 = 16 > 0 \quad f_{xx} = -8 > 0 \quad \text{local minimum}$$

(8 points) 2. Find the minimum and maximum values of $f(x, y) = 3x + y$ subject to the constraint $x^2 + y^2 = 10$.

$$\nabla f = \begin{pmatrix} 3 \\ 1 \end{pmatrix} \quad \nabla g = \begin{pmatrix} 2x \\ 2y \end{pmatrix}$$

$$\nabla f = \lambda \nabla g$$

$$3 = 2x\lambda \quad 1 = 2y\lambda \quad x^2 + y^2 = 10$$

$$x = \frac{3}{2\lambda} \quad y = \frac{1}{2\lambda}$$

$$x^2 + y^2 = 10$$

$$\left(\frac{3}{2\lambda}\right)^2 + \left(\frac{1}{2\lambda}\right)^2 = 10$$

$$\frac{9}{4\lambda^2} + \frac{1}{4\lambda^2} = 10$$

$$\frac{10}{4\lambda^2} = 10$$

$$10 = 40\lambda^2$$

$$\lambda^2 = \frac{1}{4}$$

$$x = \pm \frac{1}{2}$$


$$x = \frac{1}{2} \quad x = 3, y = 1$$

$$x = -\frac{1}{2} \quad x = -3, y = -1$$

$$f(3, 1) = 10 \quad \text{maximum}$$

$$f(-3, -1) = -10 \quad \text{minimum}$$

(5 points) 3. Estimate $\iint_R (x^2 + xy^2) dA$ where $R = [0, 4] \times [0, 4]$ by dividing R into four equal squares and evaluating the function at the upper right corner of each square.



$$A \approx f(2, 2) \cdot 4 + f(4, 2) \cdot 4 + f(2, 4) \cdot 4 + f(4, 4) \cdot 4$$


$$A \approx 12 \cdot 4 + 32 \cdot 4 + 36 \cdot 4 + 80 \cdot 4$$

$$A \approx 48 + 128 + 144 + 320$$

$$A \approx 640$$


(4 points) 4. Sketch the region of integration and reverse the order of integration.

$$\int_0^9 \int_{\sqrt{x}}^3 \frac{dydx}{y^3 + 1}$$




$$\int_0^3 \int_0^y \frac{1}{y^3+1} dv dy$$

(7 points) 5. Evaluate the double integral $\iint_D (x^2 + 2y) dA$ where D is the region bounded by $y = x$, $y = x^3$, $x \geq 0$.




$$\begin{aligned} \int_0^1 \int_{x^3}^x (x^2 + 2y) dy dx &= \int_0^1 (x^2 y + y^2) \Big|_{x^3}^x dx = \int_0^1 [(x^3 + x^7) - (x^5 + x^6)] dx \\ &= \int_0^1 (x^3 + x^2 - x^5 - x^6) dx = \left(\frac{x^4}{4} + \frac{x^3}{3} - \frac{x^6}{6} - \frac{x^7}{7} \right) \Big|_0^1 \\ &= \frac{1}{4} + \frac{1}{3} - \frac{1}{6} - \frac{1}{7} = \frac{21 + 28 - 14 - 12}{84} = \frac{23}{84} \end{aligned}$$

(7 points) 6. Use a double integral to find the area of the region inside the cardioid $r = 1 + \sin \theta$ and outside the circle $r = 1$.



$$\begin{aligned} & \int_0^{\pi} \int_{1-\sin\theta}^{1+\sin\theta} r dr d\theta = \int_0^{\pi} \frac{r^2}{2} \Big|_1^{1+\sin\theta} d\theta \\ &= \frac{1}{2} \int_0^{\pi} [(1+\sin\theta)^2 - 1] d\theta = \frac{1}{2} \int_0^{\pi} (1+2\sin\theta + \sin^2\theta - 1) d\theta \\ &= \frac{1}{2} \int_0^{\pi} (2\sin\theta + \sin^2\theta) d\theta = \frac{1}{2} \int_0^{\pi} (2\sin\theta + \frac{1}{2} - \frac{1}{2}\cos 2\theta) d\theta \\ &= \frac{1}{2} \left(-2\cos\theta + \frac{1}{2}\theta - \frac{1}{4}\sin 2\theta \right) \Big|_0^{\pi} = \frac{1}{2} \left[(\pi + \frac{\pi}{2}) - (-2) \right] = \frac{1}{2} \left(4 + \frac{\pi}{2} \right) \\ &= 2 + \frac{\pi}{4} \end{aligned}$$

(7 points) 7. Find the volume of the solid whose base is the region in the xy -plane that is bounded by the lines $y = x$, $x = 0$, and $x + y = 2$ while the top of the solid is bounded by the paraboloid $z = x^2 + y^2$.



$$\begin{aligned} & \int_0^1 \int_0^{2-x} \int_0^{x^2+y^2} dz dy dx = \int_0^1 \int_x^{2-x} z \Big|_0^{x^2+y^2} dy dx = \int_0^1 \int_x^{2-x} (x^2+y^2) dy dx \\ &= \int_0^1 (x^2y + \frac{y^3}{3}) \Big|_x^{2-x} dx = \int_0^1 \left[x^2(2-x) + \frac{(2-x)^3}{3} \right] - \left[x^3 + \frac{x^3}{3} \right] dx \\ &= \int_0^1 \left(2x^2 - x^3 + \frac{(2-x)^3}{3} - \frac{4x^3}{3} \right) dx = \int_0^1 \left[2x^2 - \frac{7}{3}x^3 + \frac{(2-x)^3}{3} \right] dx = \left[\frac{2}{3}x^3 - \frac{7x^4}{12} - \frac{(2-x)^4}{12} \right] \Big|_0^1 \\ &= \left(\frac{2}{3} - \frac{7}{12} - \frac{11}{12} \right) - \left(-\frac{16}{12} \right) = \frac{2}{3} - \frac{7}{12} - \frac{1}{12} + \frac{4}{3} = 2 - \frac{8}{12} = 2 - \frac{2}{3} \\ &= \frac{4}{3} \end{aligned}$$

$$(4-4x+x^2)(2-x)$$

$$8-16x-8x^2+4x^3+2x^2-x^3$$

(7 points) 8. Find the volume of the solid bounded above by

$z = 4 - 4(x^2 + y^2)$ and bounded below by $z = (x^2 + y^2)^2 - 1$. Use cylindrical coordinates.

$$\int_0^{2\pi} \int_0^1 \int_{(r^2)^2-1}^{4-4r^2} r \, dz \, dr \, d\theta$$

$$= \int_0^{2\pi} \int_0^1 r z \Big|_{r^4-1}^{4-4r^2} dr \, d\theta$$

$$= \int_0^{2\pi} \int_0^1 r [(4-4r^2) - (r^4-1)] dr \, d\theta = \int_0^{2\pi} \int_0^1 r (5 - 4r^2 - r^4) dr \, d\theta$$

$$= \int_0^{2\pi} \int_0^1 (5r - 4r^3 - r^5) dr \, d\theta = \int_0^{2\pi} \left(\frac{5}{2}r^2 - r^4 - \frac{1}{6}r^6 \right) \Big|_0^1 d\theta$$

$$= \int_0^{2\pi} \left(\frac{5}{2} - 1 - \frac{1}{6} \right) d\theta = \int_0^{2\pi} \frac{15-6-1}{6} d\theta = \int_0^{2\pi} \frac{8}{6} d\theta = \frac{4}{3} \theta \Big|_0^{2\pi} = \frac{8\pi}{3}$$

$$4 - 4r^2 = (r^2)^2 - 1$$


$$4 - 4r^2 = r^4 - 1$$

$$0 = r^4 + 4r^2 - 5$$

$$0 = (r^2 + 5)(r^2 - 1)$$

$$r^2 - 1 = 0$$

$$r = 1$$



(5 points) 9. Set up the integral in spherical coordinates that would find the volume of the solid that lies between the spheres $x^2 + y^2 + z^2 = 9$ and $x^2 + y^2 + z^2 = 16$.

$$\int_0^{2\pi} \int_0^{\pi} \int_3^4 \rho^2 \sin\phi \, d\phi \, d\rho \, d\theta$$

(5 points) 10. Set up the integral that would compute the surface area of the part of the paraboloid $z = x^2 + y^2$ that lies under the plane $z = 5$.

$$\begin{aligned}x^2 + y^2 &= 5 \\r^2 &= 5 \\r &= \sqrt{5}\end{aligned}$$

$$\int_0^{2\pi} \int_0^{\sqrt{5}} \sqrt{(2x)^2 + (2y)^2 + 1} r \, dr \, d\theta$$

(7 points) 11. Given $\vec{F} = (e^z)\hat{i} + (xz)\hat{j} + (x+y)\hat{k}$ and the curve $\vec{r}(t) = t^2\hat{i} + t^3\hat{j} - tk\hat{k}$, $0 \leq t \leq 1$. Find the work done by \vec{F} over $\vec{r}(t)$.

$$\vec{r}'(t) = 2t\hat{i} + 3t^2\hat{j} - k\hat{k}$$

$$\vec{F} \cdot \vec{r}'(t) = [e^{-t} + t^2(-t)\hat{i} + (t^2+t^3)\hat{k}] \cdot [2t\hat{i} + 3t^2\hat{j} - k\hat{k}]$$

$$= 2te^{-t} - 3t^5 - t^2 - t^3.$$

$$= - \int te^{-t} dt$$

$$u = t \quad dv = e^{-t} dt$$

$$du = dt \quad v = -e^{-t}$$

$$\int te^{-t} dt = -te^{-t} + \int e^{-t} dt$$

$$= -te^{-t} - e^{-t} + C$$

$$\begin{aligned}\int_0^1 (2te^{-t} - 3t^5 - t^2 - t^3) dt &= (-2te^{-t} - 2e^{-t} - \frac{1}{2}t^6 - \frac{1}{3}t^3 - \frac{1}{4}t^4) \Big|_0^1 \\&= (-2e^{-1} - 2e^{-1} - \frac{1}{2} - \frac{1}{3} - \frac{1}{4}) - (-2) \\&= -\frac{4}{e} - \frac{1}{2} - \frac{1}{3} - \frac{1}{4} + 2 = \frac{-4 + 11}{e} = \frac{7}{e}\end{aligned}$$

(7 points) 12. Evaluate $\int_C (3x^2 + 2y) ds$ where C is the straight line segment from $(3, 6)$ to $(5, 2)$.

$$\vec{PQ} = \langle 2, -4 \rangle \quad x = 3 + 2t, \quad y = 6 - 4t \quad 0 \leq t \leq 1$$

$$\begin{aligned}\int_0^1 [3(3+2t)^2 + 2(6-4t)] \sqrt{(20^2 + (-4)^2)} dt &= \int_0^1 [3(9 + 12t + 4t^2) + 12 - 8t] 2\sqrt{5} dt \\&= 2\sqrt{5} \int_0^1 (27 + 36t + 12t^2 + 12 - 8t) dt = 2\sqrt{5} \int_0^1 (12t^2 + 28t + 39) dt \\&= 2\sqrt{5} \left(4t^3 + \frac{1}{4}t^2 + 39t \right) \Big|_0^1 = 2\sqrt{5} (4 + 14 + 39) = 314\sqrt{5}\end{aligned}$$

13. Given the transformation: $u = x + 2y$, $v = x - y$.

(3 points) a. Solve the system for x and y in terms of u and v .

$$\begin{aligned} x &= u - 2y & v &= u - 2y - y \\ 3y &= u - v & x &= u - 2\left(\frac{1}{3}u - \frac{1}{3}v\right) \\ y &= \frac{1}{3}u - \frac{1}{3}v & x &= u - \frac{2}{3}u + \frac{2}{3}v \\ & & x &= \frac{1}{3}u + \frac{2}{3}v \end{aligned}$$

(3 points) b. Find the Jacobian, $\frac{\partial(x, y)}{\partial(u, v)}$.

$$\frac{\partial(x, y)}{\partial(u, v)} = \begin{vmatrix} \frac{\partial x}{\partial u} & \frac{\partial y}{\partial u} \\ \frac{\partial x}{\partial v} & \frac{\partial y}{\partial v} \end{vmatrix} = \begin{vmatrix} \frac{1}{3} & \frac{1}{3} \\ \frac{2}{3} & -\frac{1}{3} \end{vmatrix} = -\frac{1}{9} - \frac{2}{9} = -\frac{1}{3}$$

(5 points) c. Find the image under the given transformation of the triangular region bounded by the lines $y = 0$, $y = x$, and $x + 2y = 2$.

$$y = 0 : \quad \frac{1}{3}u - \frac{1}{3}v = 0 \Rightarrow u = v$$

$$y = x : \quad \frac{1}{3}u - \frac{1}{3}v = \frac{1}{3}u + \frac{2}{3}v \Rightarrow v = 0$$

$$x + 2y = 2 : \quad \frac{1}{3}u + \frac{2}{3}v + 2\left(\frac{1}{3}u - \frac{1}{3}v\right) = 2 \Rightarrow u = 2$$

14. Given $\vec{F} = (e^{2y} - y \cos xy) \hat{i} + (2xe^{2y} - x \cos xy + 2y) \hat{j}$.

(3 points) a. Verify \vec{F} is a conservative vector field.

$$\frac{\partial P}{\partial y} = 2e^{2y} - \cos xy + xy \sin xy$$

$$\frac{\partial P}{\partial y} = \frac{\partial Q}{\partial x}$$

$$\frac{\partial Q}{\partial x} = 2e^{2y} - \cos y + xy \sin xy$$

$\therefore \vec{F}$ is conservative

(5 points) b. Find the potential function.

$$f(x, y) = \int P dx = \int (e^{2y} - y \cos xy) dx = xe^{2y} - \sin xy + g(y)$$

$$\frac{\partial f}{\partial y} = 2xe^{2y} - x \cos xy + g'(y) = Q$$

$$2xe^{2y} - x \cos xy + g'(y) = 2xe^{2y} - x \cos xy + dy$$

$$g'(y) = dy$$


$$g(y) = y^2 + C$$

$$\therefore f(x, y) = xe^{2y} - \sin xy + y^2 + C$$

15. Given a thin plate of constant density $\delta = 3$ bounded by the x -axis, $y = x^3$, and $x = 1$.

(3 points) a. Set up the integral that would compute M_x .

$$\int_0^1 \int_0^{x^3} y \cdot 3 \, dy \, dx$$



(3 points) b. Set up the integral that would compute I_y .

$$\int_0^1 \int_0^{x^3} x^2 \cdot 3 \, dy \, dx$$
